

## An Amazing Tenth Anniversary!

PIE turned 10 years old in 2010; and what an amazing tenth year this has been. On August 18, 2000, PIE was formed to promote the advancement of education and learning in secondary schools in Ghana and to further cross-cultural understanding both within and between the U.S. and Ghana. It has been ten years of modest success in fundraising, and ten years of reaching thousands of secondary school students all over Ghana. Over the ten years it has been in existence, PIE has made grants to 28 secondary schools in Ghana. Grants have consisted of computer equipment for the establishment of computer labs for students, and equipment and materials for use in science labs in schools. There is no doubt that PIE's grants have made a major difference in the lives of the thousands of students who attend the 28 schools that have received grants from PIE. For its tenth year, PIE established a goal of raising \$25,000 in contributions to support its mission. This was indeed a stretch goal for PIE as the organization had never received that much in a year. Amazingly, we not only reached the goal, we doubled it! Total donations for the year ended July 31, 2010, were \$51,480! Among the big drivers in this achievement was the November 2009, gala fundraiser hosted by Mr. Joe Osei in Houston, Texas, and a July 2010 gala fundraiser in Washington, DC jointly sponsored with the 1980 Year Group of the Mfantshipim Old Boys Association. In addition to the galas in Houston and Washington, in July 2010, PIE held its Sixth Annual Golf Tournament in Northern Virginia. For the sixth year in a row, the event was hosted by Thompson Grant, a member of PIE's Advisory Board,

As we celebrate our tenth anniversary, we are grateful for our many donors, and volunteers, who have invested their money, time, and talents to enable us provide grants to schools in each of the 10 regions of Ghana. We look ahead to provide grants to enable Ghana secondary schools provide better instruction to thousands of students in science and technology. # The year in review

September 2010

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PIE completed two shipments to Ghana during the year ended July 31, 2010. We shipped 45 personal computers for distribution to eleven secondary schools at total cost of \$10,000. The shipment also included commercial-grade laboratory equipment (donated by Huntsman) estimated at \$11,000. The University of Mines and Technology- Tarkwa, was the beneficiary institution.

Our second shipment comprised of chemicals and glassware (\$16,000) for science laboratories, arrived in Ghana during the last week of June. Upon distribution, our school count will reach 34!

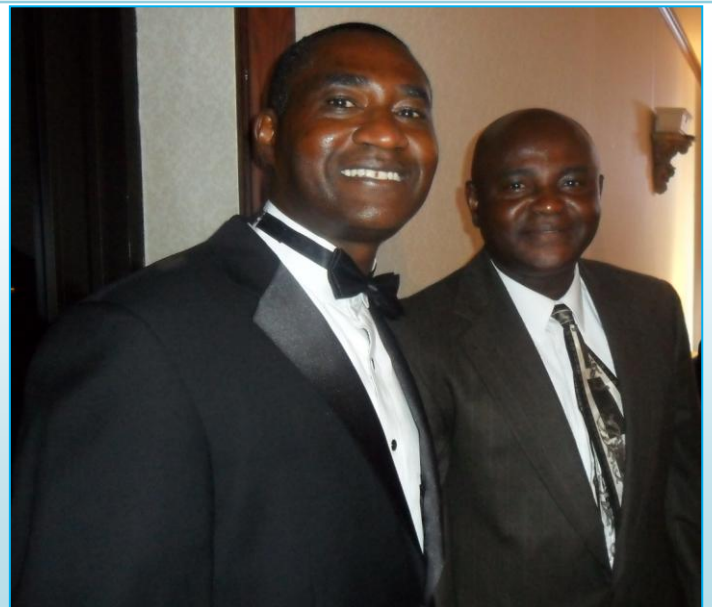

## Visit to Savelugu and Tamale Secondary Schools, Ghana Inspection Report prepared by Carly Williamson, Huntersville, N.C., for PIE July 2010

### Savelugu and Tamale

I visited Savelugu on July 3<sup>rd</sup>. It is only about a ten minute taxi ride from downtown Tamale. The school was the most impressive I have seen in the area and very well kept. The headmaster was able to locate the donations records and tell me exactly what PIE had donated to their school. He told me that they had received four computers and a printer. One computer was still in the headmaster's office, the printer was being used in the secretary's office. The other three computers were placed in the computer lab. The lab had a variety of different computers, about fifteen working ones in total. The PIE computers were certainly the most advanced, and placed in the front of the room.

I was given a tour of the school by the headmaster and a few other teachers. They were all very thankful for the computers. They asked me to put in my report that they were extremely thankful for the supplies that PIE had already supplied them, and if PIE was interested in donating anything else to the school they are in great need of science lab supplies, such as beakers, testing tubes etc.

I toured the Tamale Senior High School which was also very nice. I told the assistant headmaster about PIE's mission and goals. He was very excited and said they would be thankful for any donations they would receive, but he too told me of their school's need for science lab supplies. He told me that they currently have about ten computers in the school.
